## 8-point Discharge Checklist



Before discharging your patient from your care, it's important to review some essential ostomy skills, facts and precautions with them to help with a smooth transition.

# Review this eight-point discharge checklist with your patient to make sure they know how to:

- Empty the pouch
- Remove the pouching system
- Assess and care for the stoma and the skin around the stoma
- Apply the pouching system
- Assess the signs of potential complications and know when to contact a healthcare professional
- Manage gas and odor
- □ Follow dietary and fluid guidelines

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## 8-point Discharge Checklist (continued)

#### **Empty your pouch**

Exactly how a pouch is emptied depends on the type of pouch chosen. For example, with a closed pouch, simply remove and dispose. Whereas a drainable or Urostomy pouch requires draining. Be sure to empty the pouch when it is 1/3 to 1/2 full.

#### Applying and changing your pouching system

It is best to change the pouching system when the stoma is least active. Often people find this is first thing in the morning. Once in a routine, the rhythm of the body should help estimate the best time to change the pouching system.

#### Complications of the skin around the stoma

The skin around the stoma should be as healthy as the rest of the abdomen. Occasionally, skin issues may arise so it is suggested to check for leaks, skin irritation around the stoma, excessive stoma bleeding, and other potential complications that warrant contacting a stoma care nurse.


